A long-time volunteer at In the Heart of the Beast Theater and its May Day Parade, Elise brings over eight years experience working with young people to the project. In 2006, she led the efforts of 40 neighbors to mural the 34th and Cedar Shell gas station.

The project aims to demonstrate to participants and neighbors the transformative power of art, and to replace destructive behavior such as graffiti vandalism with authentic expressions of identity. Support is provided by the Metropolitan Regional Arts Council (MRAC) through an appropriation by the Minnesota Legislature. Paint is supplied by the Valspar Foundation.

Pedestrian Improvements Come to Hiawatha/Lake

If you've ever walked under the Hiawatha bridge along Lake Street, you know there's room for improvement. This major traffic interchange can be as confusing for drivers as it is for pedestrians.

But as you'll see today, new concrete is being poured and the shape of the roadways and

walkways are changing. Enlarged pedestrian "islands" are being created to enhance pedestrian safety—the walking distance across each lane of traffic will become much shorter. These triangular concrete islands—sometimes called "pork chops" by engineers—will also help to direct and calm cars coming to Lake

Street from Hiawatha in either direction.

Other promised improvements include enhanced lighting and crosswalk markings, and making space for future public art installations.

The improvements are a project of Hennepin County with help from local consultants.

The Midtown Farmers' Market has lots of great stuff available and the selection continues to unfold as fall approaches. The fresh flowers are one of my favorite things to stop and admire – Nature is so amazing.

I have recently been purchasing meat and eggs at the market and if you are not familiar with the differences between grain fed and grazing, it is something to check out. As I understand it, the animals which graze are not digesting residual traces of herbicides and pesticides which may have been applied to the grain crop. The traces of these chemicals can then be found in the food we derive from the animals. As I understand it, it is better for us and for the environment when animals are allowed to roam freely and graze naturally, and then their meat and eggs taste better, too- try it for yourself to see!

Shopping the Market for fresh produce can

definitely save you money compared to the larger grocery stores – things like peppers and beans are less expensive and fresher too. But shopping at the Market has other economic benefits beyond our pocket book. Supporting our local farmers directly, especially with the dry weather they have had to deal with, puts money right back into our local economy. Buying from a grocer also supports our local economy of course. They employ hundreds of people locally, but shopping the market puts the money where your mouth is – so to speak. Other things I contemplate when thinking about Market v. Grocery are the warehouses of food, the trucking/shipping, refrigeration and the spoilage. These activities all contribute to our cost – whether financial or ecological.

The Market is more than an outdoor grocer. With fresh coffee or juice and snacks, live music and artists goods, it is a great place to

people watch. I think of places like the market as samplings of the greater community and it is true here. Seeing the diversity which comes forth gives me a sense of pride in this city. We are fortunate to have such a wide spectrum of ethnic backgrounds and it is easy to think it is the same elsewhere – but it is not. Some cities in the country are still very segregated. As I get older, and have watched my parents' age, I see how the lack of exposure to people who are different slowly turns into a fear of those differences. My fear is that I could follow in those footsteps without noticing. Once the fear has taken hold, it can be very hard to shake it loose. I am not saying we don't have room for improvement, but by living and working side by side, it becomes easier to see how much alike we are, and also appreciate how we each are unique.

 The meeting was abbreviated to one hour and was held at the home of Gwen McMahon and followed by the annual board picnic for staff, board members, and their families.

 Joanna Stone has resigned as the market manger. She will stay through the current season and assist this Fall with the transition to the next manager. The Executive Committee in the capacity of the personnel committee has met with Amy to discuss next steps for the hiring of a replacement for Joanna. It was noted that given that the Market is wrapping up its 5th season, Joanna's departure is an opportunity for the market to reassess its personnel needs which potentially include marketing, publicity, vendor relations, volunteer management, and grant writing. Billy noted that in a larger context the planning being requested of the Market Committee is a continuation of the board's discussion (started earlier this summer) regarding oversight and governance of CNO committees. All committees are being asked to create policies as part of their goal setting in the coming months. The resignation of Joanna underscores the need for such policy to ensure easy and timely succession of staff and volunteers and accelerates the timetable for the market committee. It was noted by several board members that the market committee should be empowered to do this work rather than have the CNO Board step in and dictate what the market

policies would be. Jessica Ward-Denison (Chair) presented an outline of work to be done by committees in general and the market in specific. The key points presented for all committees are the following; (1) A governance structure and clearly defined job descriptions for chair, vice-chair, secretary and treasurer that includes an accountability structure. (2) Structure for sub-committees and task forces to work on specific issues as needed. (3) Definitions of committee and staff needs, expectations, and goals. Items Specific to Midtown Farmers Market Advisory Committee are (1) to work with market manager and executive director to create a job description for the hiring market manager and timeline. (2) Develop a sustainability plan for the market. (3) Articulate a timeline for planning and manager hire Gwen reminded the board that all committee structures must adhere to the bi-laws of CNO. It was noted by Billy that the Board is responsible for the fiscal health of the organization as a whole including the market. Kevin suggested that several board members go to the next market advisory meeting to present and discuss the request for policy and brief the committee on the process for the hiring of the next market manager. The executive committee was already planning on visiting the committee— Jessica, Billy and Mike will attend.

OQVKQP: The Housing Committee supports the proposed action by CPED to offer by direct sale at a nominal price the non-buildable, 15 foot wide parcel at 1847 E. 31st St. – a vacant, tax-forfeited parcel – to both adjacent property owners on E. 31st Street.

OQVKQP: In support of CNO's new "Block Talks" project, which aims to foster citizen involvement in environment, waste reduction, and energy conservation activities, the Housing Committee will allocate its NRP Curb Appeal dollars to the project as follows: \$1500 in 2007 and \$1500 in 2008.
OQVKQP: The Committees support the Good Neighbor Agreement as presented by developers of the Midtown Eco Energy Biomass Facility, and nominate Gwen McMahon to be Corcoran's representative on its citizen Advisory Committee.
OQVKQP: The Committees nominate Karl Stoerzinger to be Corcoran's new representative on the board of the Midtown Greenway Coalition. Made by Kevin, second by Gerry, motion carried unanimously.

CNO is welcoming our new staff member as part of the Latinos En Acción program. "Tina" Maria Tavera is filling the role doing outreach and organizing in the Latino Community in Corcoran, Powderhorn, and Longfellow neighborhoods. Tina jumped right in translating National Night Out flyers to be able to connect block club leaders with the Latino neighbors.

Tina earned a masters degree in public affairs from the University of Minnesota's Humphrey Institute where she found the Latinos En Acción job posting. This job is a good fit for Tina as she has experience making connections with Spanish speaking families. She was

already was using her bilingual skills to provide support in the Latino community for many years and lives in the Powderhorn neighborhood with her husband and two kids.

Tina is an Archibald Bush Leadership Fellow and she studied Leadership Arts. She is an artist and founded Mira Gallery at the Instituto de Cultura y Educacion. She also serves on the Minnesota Artists Exhibition Panel (MAEP) selecting local artists' work for the Minneapolis Institute of Arts and has organized exhibitions by Latino artists. Tina also worked for 10 years with TRIO programs to help low income, first-generation, college-bound students.

As noted in the Advocate on the CNO website on July 31, 2007, Latinos En Acción is a program of the Corcoran Neighborhood Organization (CNO) in partnership with



Longfellow Community Council (LCC), Powderhorn Park Neighborhood Association (PPNA), and the Resource Center of the Americas (RCTA). The purpose of the project is to build cohesive and inclusive communities by conducting outreach to Latino businesses and residents. This includes identifying and empowering community members to address issues that impact the Latino community

and connecting and linking the Latino community to non-Latino communities. Some of the areas Tina plans to work on are housing, crime, and health. Tina sees her role as a community liaison to provide outreach, connecting the Latino

community to resources and organizing and communicating about events. Tina was active in the tail end of organizing La Feria Latino Health Fair at the Midtown Farmer's Market on August 11, 2007.

The community organizer position is funded by the McKnight Foundation and Payne Lake Community Partners. Payne-Lake Community Partners (PLCP) is a community development initiative created to revitalize and invest in two Twin Cities commercial corridors and the surrounding neighborhoods - Lake Street and the Payne-Arcade and Phalen Corridor of St. Paul. The following was submitted by the Senator and was written by Dr. Windal.

"Families without the ability to pay the rising costs of funeral services have an alternative funeral home now," says Claudia Windal, the owner and licensed funeral director of THE WAY OF THE PEOPLE (Oyate Tawicohan) Funeral Services located in the Nokomis neighborhood of South Minneapolis. Dr. Windal continued by saying that, "traditional funeral homes find it difficult, if not impossible, to work within the financial constraints of county funeral funding." THE WAY OF THE PEOPLE Funeral Services is committed to working on an individual by individual basis and to offering choices of services and merchandise to families of all financial means. "If a family comes in wanting a \$30,000 funeral, I can do that; I wouldn't especially like to have anyone spend that much, but if that is the desire of the family, I will offer that to them." As a Lakota Indian, Dr. Windal is aware of the poverty among many of her Native sisters and brothers both on reservations and in urban communities. She began the Indian Burial Assistance Project in 2000 in response to a call for help transferring a body from Chicago to MN. This grew into providing transportation of

remains out of state to a number of Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa reservations. In order to respond to the high cost of traditional funeral services, Windal realized that she needed to become a licensed funeral director and graduated from the U of MN Mortuary Science Program in 2003. The OYATE TAWICOHAN (Way of the People) Funeral Home is located at 5032 34th Avenue in South Minneapolis. The phone at the funeral home is 612-724-5000 and is answered 24hours a day. The funeral home provides all death care services from the removal of the deceased to the funeral home, preparation of the remains, funeral arrangements and also works with a local crematory for cremation services.
Dr. Windal has assisted the Tohono o'Odam Tribe of Arizona in opening their own funeral home and she is in conversation with tribal leaders from several other out of state Tribes in bringing funeral services back to the people and on the reservations.

If you have ever grown tomatoes, are still growing tomatoes, you may have noticed splits in your tomatoes. It is very common for tomatoes to split, I hope those splits look nothing like the splits I do! The reason for these ugly slights are heat and moisture stress. Too much of either will cause ugly splits that look like the one's I do, you can't imagine what they look like, though they are harmless but ugly.

If you find tomatoes with large cracks around the stems, this splitting is caused by moisture stress, when the tomatoes becomes too plump too quickly and literally burst through the skin. Have you ever had this situation happen to you? You go out and eat too much too quickly, and guess what, you felt like a huge balloon that was ready to explode!

Now, if these splits are going down from the stem toward the bottom of the fruit, this is heat stress. Heat stress occurs when there are long periods of bright sunlight and temperatures above 90 degrees. It's too late for these type of temps. I hope that is true! No more 90's this year please!

To help prevent splits from moisture or heat stress, maintain even moisture and good drainage for your plants. A thick layer of mulch or compost will help regulate the moisture and temperatures of the soil around your plants, which will help relief splitting. You should

remove all ripe and nearly ripe tomatoes after a heavy rain, before they have a chance to split. The tomatoes that are near ripe can finish ripening on your kitchen counter.

Remember the splits are cosmetic and won't affect the flavor of the tomatoes. They need to be picked immediately to maintain that great tomato flavor. The last comment about picking your tomatoes (after they split): get the tomatoes off immediately or they could get invaded by insects or mold in the open cracks.

I hope this column helps you for the remainder of this summer and next summer. Remember constant soil temperatures for split-free tomatoes.
